30th Pack Weekend at the Mourneshore Hilton

A small group of Cubs and Leaders from 30th were delighted to be invited to spend their first weekend at Andrew Totten's cottage, Mourneshore in Ballymartin in June. Not only did the comfortable bunks and camp beds come with the luxury of optional duvets and pillows for the Leaders, but there was even a gas-fired oven and fridge and hot showers on demand! Although there is no electricity, in the evenings lighting was provided by a combination of the solar-powered panels and candles located around the cottage for added ambiance. Outside, the Leaders could relax in deckchairs or hammocks on the veranda while supervising the Cubs on the beach. And the Cubs- well they were surprisingly easy to entertain – they were fascinated by the sea life in the many rock pools adjacent to the cottage and also in splitting rocks open to find fossils- indeed they willingly invested so much of their free time engrossed in this activity that we are thinking of contracting them out to generate chipped stone for landscaping local gardens and driveways. And Bagherra even got to have a morning dip in the cold Irish Sea waters each day and swim with the seals to entertain us all while we sat munching our tea and toast!

As this was the first time the Pack had ventured south of Newcastle when in the Mournes, we sought out some new activities to experience. On Saturday morning we visited Neary Nogs Chocolate Factory to find out all about ethically sourced cocoa beans and how they are turned into chocolate. And nothing is wasted- we got to taste Cacao juice made from the white pulp that surrounds the beans, and also cocoa nibs, made from crushed beans and brimming with antioxidants with a bitter chocolate taste. After the tour, we got to sample chocolate made from African, South and Central American beans, each with their own unique flavours, before finishing with drinking chocolate. Most opted for the house blend, but our hosts showed us a chart with lots of different flavours so Akela tried orange and Bagherra peppermint. One Cub pointed out the more earthy, grassy, smoky and burnt flavours on the bottom left of the chart- and told our hosts that Akela had made them 'burnt' the previous night in the cottage!!

We then headed to Rostrevor for a hike through the forest and to the summit of Slieve Martin. The weather was not too kind at that point so we hastily retreated to the forest for our packed lunch but the sun returned once more as we made our way to Cranfield Alpacas. We were fascinated to learn all about the alpacas before an opportunity to feed them and then attempt to herd them- Akela was surprisingly good at this and was delighted by the award of his official certificate – all those years trying to herd Cubs has clearly paid off!! We rounded off the day with chips and ice cream in Kilkeel. On Sunday, after we had dragged the Cubs away from their morning shift splitting rocks and fishing in the rock pools once more, we completed another hike at Silent Valley. By this time the weather was glorious and we decided to delay our return to Belfast for the

obligatory visit to the Bon Bon, Joke Shop and Kent's Amusements in Newcastle, followed by ice cream at Morelli's. We all had a super weekend and are very grateful to Andrew for the loan of the cottage. We hope to be back very soon!!







































Oh No!!! I've shrunk Gareth!!!! Do I still get my Conservation and Gardener Badges? At least now he will fit inside my Bug Hostel!!
